

National Folk Festival 2010



Easter. Eggs. Overgrown Rabbits with fixed grins. "Dad, I'm bored". The grist to the mill of those that do not make the trip to 'the National'.

There are some who call these folk 'Muggles'. I wish they wouldn't. And this is for a large number of reasons that can only be fully ventilated over at least 4 pints of Guinness and a Kransky.

Unlike wizardry, no-one is born to be a folkie. It is an awakening thing; an epiphany perhaps. But let us leave this "folk pedigree" thang in the garbage bin, where it belongs. We all, to a greater or lesser degree, *discover* or indeed, *rediscover* folk.

And this Easter, there is so much more to rediscover at the 2010 National Folk Festival.

Having said that the Nash does tend to shape shift a wee bit. The biggest change for 2010 is a new Director! Yes, you read it right — Sebastian Flynn, former director of the Queensland Multicultural Festival, Celtic fiddler and much-travelled Scouser, is the new Managing Director — and he is very, very welcome.

"I've been made to feel welcome even before I've hit Canberra," said Sebastian, "and I am very excited about this Festival,"

"Its reputation precedes it with a fanfare. The program has an outstanding reputation for vibrancy, spontaneity and variety, and Artistic Director Dave O'Neill has put together yet another brilliant array. But for having to hit the ground running, I hope to see a goodly proportion of it".

Sebastian is also raring to go with all other aspects of the Festival program.

"I am keenly aware of the professionalism and dedication of the fulltime and volunteer staff of the Festival Office," he said.

"Such people are indispensable to the effective and efficient management of such an important event. It has a community basis and a community focus. I want to

help to strengthen and enhance that as well as help to develop some new avenues".



St Albans Folk Festival History



This year's festival will be held from Friday, 23rd April to Monday, 26th April. It was suggested to me that an article on the festivals history would be appropriate because it was thought that this was the 30th year that it had been held. However, in researching what has transpired I have discovered that some sort of event occurred in 1979 and therefore we have missed the third decimal anniversary and may be celebrating a binary age of 2 to the fifth?

There is little evidence of what occurred in 1979 and I would welcome dialog or written word with anyone that was present. The history is further confused because the first printed flyers we possess are from 1983 which claimed to be the fourth festival. The 1979 file contains only a photo of the Settlers Arms at the time and a few names. A letter written later implies that it was organised by a combination of the Newcastle Folk Club and Macquarie towns in the local hall and went well until it was disrupted when everyone adjourned to the pub.

In 1980, the event was definitely a folk festival and was reported as such in the May edition of 'Coaldust'. The number of attendees were given as 200. Significant quotes from this article are:

'Water was in short supply due to the drought. However the beer supply was such that no-one seemed to notice'

'The festival ran smoothly with just enough organised events to give the weekend some structure'

'The heart and soul of the weekend was 'The Session' which began Thursday pm and seemed to continue for the duration with few pauses for food or sleep'

There is also a list of names and among them the recently late great Alistair Hullett.

By 1983, the event was clearly developing and was held principally in the grounds of the Settlers Arms. It is known that there was a net profit of \$456 and the organisation generated a \$300 grant for artists from the Australian Folk Trust for the following year.

We have flyers for 1984 and 1985 which imply featured bands, no record of 1986, and for 1987 it was organised by the NSW Folk Federation and funded by passing the hat. These festivals were held in early May.

In 1988 the festival was held over the now traditional Anzac weekend and was a fine weather weekend. Quotes from that years report:

'This was designed to be a relaxing, unorganised weekend and such was the pattern throughout'.

The 1989 Festival report quotes: 'Thanks to Tony for getting the fire going and capturing the brown snake a la Harry Butler. Thanks to the banisters for the use of their annex and frequent cups of tea. No thanks to the drunken woman who sat on Johnny's accordion and king hit the gentle lady who tried to ease her away from fighting everyone in reach.

By 1992, it is clear that there was some more formal organisation when the luminaries of the time were Terry Gleeson and Maurie Smith.

In 1994 a marquee was hired for the first time and so began the inexorable expansion. It is clear from things written that the way the festival was financed would have to change mainly because there was no way of telling who had paid.

In 1995 David Alexander took on the directorship and secured additional sponsorship from the pub. In addition admission to venues was by a wooden token, a pre-cursor to the armbands now used.

In 1996 Terry Gleeson again seems to have had the reigns and some of the later organisers begin to appear on the program. John Grenenger, Bill Bekric and Brent 'Bilbo' Rodgers all appeared in the 'Barn'. Somebody going by the name of Scrumpy held a cider making workshop in the pub.

In 1997 John Grenenger and partner Betty Benson ran the festival with assistance from Terry and Tess Gleason. The Council and Fickle Wombat are added to the list of sponsors and the list of performers increased in length and standard.

By 1998 a weekend pass had risen to \$35 and the festival gradually expanded until Eric Bogle graced us with his presence in 2002 when he played to the biggest audience that the festival had ever seen up to that point. (That was the first St. Albans I personally attended).

Subsequent to the 2006 festival, John Grenenger resigned and I took on the directorship with Alison Boyd and John Dickenson.

2007 saw a big change for the event, not because of a change of management, but because the 'Barn' had been sold 2 years earlier and the new owners wished us away. This caused the council to take a higher interest in our activities and we were required to submit Development Applications for both the festival and our 40ft container. We also had to move the aforesaid container across the village to our new main venue on Gordon McDonalds land. The organisations finances were considerably depleted and we are indebted to those performers who played for considerably reduced money that year to allow the festival to survive.

In 2008 we had recovered enough to double the performer budget. This was a partially wet year but we still made a small profit.

2009 saw the first international act at the festival in the form of the 'Beez' from Germany plus a number of interstate artists. It was also the first time the main marquee graduated from a large pole and rope to a free standing structure. From a compliance perspective the council approved the Development Application for a number of years with certain provisions and Apra became involved and required us to buy a performance license.

It is fascinating to see how the festival has grown and it will be interesting to see where we go from here. We are very conscious that we are holding this event in the middle of a historical village, close to people's homes and realistically cannot get much bigger in that environment. However it must be said that this proximity has ensured the event remains a folk festival because we cannot field loud pop type acts. Strictly speaking the weekend is now really 2 events, where in one, the public buy tickets to see professional and semi-professional acts and the other where folks session at the pub.

Hope to see you all there keeping up the tradition and look for another article when we turn 40!

VALE: ALISTAIR HULETT 1953-28/01/2010



Alistair Hulett died at the Southern General Hospital in Glasgow on Thursday evening, January 28, 2010.

Alistair Hulett was born in Glasgow and discovered traditional music in his early teens. In 1968 he and his family moved to New Zealand where he established a reputation on the folk circuit with his large repertoire of songs and his interpretation of the big narrative ballads.

In 1971, at the age of eighteen, Alistair moved over to Australia. For a couple of years he sang his way around Australia's festivals and clubs before "going bush" for several years. During this time he began to write his own songs and, following a two-year stint on the "hippy trail" in India, he returned to Australia in 1979 to find the punk movement in full swing. He joined in with the garage ethos in a band called The Furious Chrome Dolls.

In the early 1980s Alistair was again performing folk material around Sydney and was a founding member of a five-piece punk folk outfit called Roaring Jack which specialised rocking Celtic reels and radical and revolutionary lyrics. Alistair was an active revolutionary socialist, with the International Socialist Organisation, and he and Roaring jack offered their talents for many benefits, rallies and demonstrations, in support of the antiwar movement and solidarity with workers in struggle.

For the next five years the Jacks made a startling impression on the Australian music scene. Their first album, *Street Celtabillity*, was released in 1986 and reached No. 1 on the local indie charts. By the time the second album, *The Cat Among The Pigeons* was released in 1988 the band was headlining in major Australian rock venues, as well as opening for overseas acts including Billy Bragg, the Pogues, and The Men They Couldn't Hang. The *The Cat Among The Pigeons* was nominated for an Australian

Music Industry Association (ARIA) award and was released in Europe by the German label Intercord.

Alistair's solo work was always a part of the Jacks' live shows and offers to appear at festivals and clubs in his own right drew him further back into the folk orbit. By 1989 his songs were being extensively covered by several stalwarts of the Australian folk establishment. The demise of Roaring Jack coincided with this period and after the release of their third album, *Through The Smoke of Innocence*, the band decided to call it a day despite another ARIA nomination.

Alistair's first solo CD, *Dance of the Underclass*, was recorded in 1991. Completely acoustic, with contributions from other members of Roaring Jack, the album was instantly hailed as a folk classic and proved to be the turning point in Alistair's return to the folk fold. His position as one of the most influential musicians on the Australian scene was now beyond dispute. In the UK his song, "He Fades Away", was picked up by Roy Bailey and by June Tabor and later by Andy Irvine. All three performers recorded uniquely different but thoroughly compelling interpretations of the song.

Rather than follow with more of the same Alistair recorded his solo CD with a return to the punk fuelled energy of the days with Roaring Jack. In the Backstreets of Paradise was a collection of songs originally intended as the next Jacks' release and rather than let the songs go to waste Alistair formed an acoustic outfit called The Hooligans to complete the cycle. The album caught some of Alistair's new found admirers among the purists unawares but during the next two years The Hooligans won them over with blistering live performances at every major folk festival in Australia. In the meantime Alistair continued his solo gigs with an ever growing reliance on the traditional songs that have always formed the backbone of his writing.

In 1995 Alistair compiled a collection of songs that owed little to punk and everything to the folk revival that inspired him in the sixties. *Saturday Johnny and Jimmy The Rat* was originally intended as a solo affair in homage to the likes of Ewan MacColl, Jeannie Robertson and Davie Stewart, as well as an acknowledgment of the time when the folk movement was a vital political and musical force.

At the time Dave Swarbrick was living in Australia and Alistair toyed with the idea of inviting Swarb to join him in the studio. Nothing more would have come of the notion had it not been for a phone call from a friend saying that Swarb wouldn't mind working with the bloke who had

written "The Swaggies Have All Waltzed Matilda Away". Thus was forged a musical partnership that has won acclaim from audiences and critics alike.

Following a hugely successful Australian tour the duo returned to the UK.. A triumphant perormance at Sidmouth in 1996 was broadcast by the BBC and was followed by a live in studio session a few weeks later. Since then Alistair and Dave have toured extensively in the UK, returned to Australia for another successful tour and recorded their second album together. *The Cold Grey Light of Dawn* was enthusiastically received and gathered some impressive reviews

Alistair, having returned to live in Scotland, continued to work solo and with Swarb. He wrote and performed three workshop presentations. "From Blackheath To Trafalgar Square" looked at "insurrection and resistance in the Disunited Kingdom" from the Peasants' Revolt to the poll tax riots. "The Fire Last Time" was a study of the protest song movement of the 1960s and "Red Clydeside" examined the working class unrest on the Clyde between 1915 and 1920

Alistair, based once again in Glasgow, toured Australia in a double bill with US singer/songwriter David Rovics in December 2008 - January 2009. Playing benefits for Australia's leading radical newspaper. Two more solo albums, In Sleepy Scotland and more recently Riches And Rags, confirmed Alistair Hulett's position as one of the most consistent songwriters. musicians and interpreters of the tradition in Scotland. Folk On Tap called him "One of the defining voices of Scottish music" and a reviewer in the influential music magazine fROOTS wrote: "Hulett is at once an intense singer, radiating conviction, and a genuinely imaginative lyricist."

In partnership with 1960s veteran Scots folksinger Jimmy Ross, Alistair Hulett presented word and song presentations with powerpoint visual images at various events and festivals around the UK. Alistair and Jimmy shared a common political perspective, with both being deeply involved in socialist politics, and this bond was evident in the scripts they prepared together for these presentations. Most recently, Alistair Hulett joined with several Yorkshire based musicians to form a five-piece, semielectric band called The Malkies.. This was Hulett's first return to working with a fulltime band since Roaring Jack called it a day in 1992. Their debut album was Suited And Booted (2008)

There would have been over 50 people there, including a group called Southerly Gaels (who I hadn't heard of before) singing Scottish songs; a singer from Maleny celebrating her father's 80th birthday with her brother and sister - there were

separate contributions from all four of them; and there were people who'd stayed on after Politics in the Pub who enjoyed the experience and added their names to the mailing list. About half the people there sang - and I'm sure once the sessions become a regular thing, more will feel emboldened. I totted up 43 titles and there were many highlights, the most poignant being the half dozen songs written by Alistair Hulett who had died in Glasgow just the week before.

The other big session that occurred in February (I counted just under 70 people) was the Request night on the James Craig on Thursday 11th. Sandra Nixon and John Warner were celebrating birthdays and, as stalwarts of the James Craig Shanty Sessions, were given the choice of asking for songs they wanted to hear. The 40 odd songs sung included some originals - highlights being Robin Connaughton's ballad to the tune of Long Lankin; Cathy Rystmeister's response to Tony Abbott's injunction to girls about their Precious Gift; Amalina's dig at Lord Monckton and his lies; and Jennifer Lees singing a song John Warner wrote for her birthday some years ago - Whose Hands Held This Clay. And a stranger hearing the range of songs that night could not but be impressed with the high standard of writing and of the singing. And the supper wasn't half bad!!



This is a CD that should be in every home and car. Certainly every one who has seen Ami at her live performances will want a copy. I have been fortunate enough to see Ami's live shows at last years National, at a great concert in Narrabri and then at the official CD launch at this years Tamworth Country Music Festival.

Ami has crafted ten delightful little stories and set them to beautiful melodies. She has a wonderful singing voice and a stage presence that combines all the influences from her diverse musical background, growing up with a father who is one of the giants of the Australian country music scene, High school was at Sydney's McDonald College school of performing arts followed by a Bachelor of Music at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music and then to round everything of studying opera in Germany.

Ami accompanies her songs that are all great little folk songs on a piano keyboard often with the support of a mouth organ. She also plays an Appellation Mountain dulcimer and plays a neat drum. Ami's music to my ear is great contemporary folk music but she could be equally at home in just about any setting including entertaining Australian Soldiers in Afghanistan.




Jane M Harding's CD 'Songs From The Road'

This is Jane's first CD and I am sure that there will be more. Jane lives in the beautiful regional centre of Coonabarabran nestled against the majestic Warrumbungle Mountains. She is a comparatively recent convert to the beauty of folk song and she has embraced the whole folk scene regularly attending the Dubbo Folk club and crafting her songs while travelling the eastern states to attend and often perform at clubs and folk festivals.

This is a well crafted CD of 11 songs with words and music by Jane, she has composed a very nice tune for Banjo Paterson's poem 'The Artesian Water' and the 13th track is a great little set of tunes. Jane has a very good ear for music and the ability to write very pleasant melodic tunes that suit her interesting stories. Her songs tell stories of every day life, bushrangers and the places and people that she has met on her travels. Jane accompanies herself on her Jack Spira Australian guitar and Mitch Smith Australian low F whistle. Col Bernau joins her with Mandolin and Amanda Broberg plays Irish bouzouki. This array of very well played instruments certainly complement Jane's very pleasant voice and good songs. Probably my favourite song is Coolaburragundy the songs talks about the lovely town of Coolah and its very pretty setting.

I would recommend this CD and it would I am sure receive plenty of spins in any folkies home or car. Lime & Steel Tales of Love, Murder...and Trains (Ind)


From the misty hills of 'County Katoomba', comes this collection of chilled out dirt music. The tracks meander in easy fashion - welcoming, earthy, poignant and fun. The mix of colonial and Celtic-style folk includes a couple of traditional tunes such as 'The Banshee' and 'Whiskey Before Breakfast'. Originals cover history (convicts, opium dens, anti-Chinese riots of the Gold Rush) and universal 21st century themes. Both new parenthood ('Sleep On, My Precious Time Bomb') and love of the latté ('The Juice of the Bean') are blamed for sleep deprivation. There's a full swag of humour and heart - what got 'em through in the old days. Tender love stories are told on 'Scatter the Ashes' and a fine cover of Gary Shearston's 'Bonnie Jess'. On 'Patyegorang', guest vocalist Kate Bain sings the part of an Eora woman (in language) in gentle harmony with her white lieutenant.

Lime & Steel are: Ben Scott (also a member of the Spooky Men's Chorale) on vocals, low whistle, guitar and mandolin; Paddy Connor (vocals, banjo, penny whistles, uillean pipes, guitar) and Ian Morrison (drums) with guests Tinker Duffy (accordion) and Chris Gillespie (bass). Economic delivery – without fear or flashiness - understates some very fine musicianship. You'll feel like cradling a pint among friends as you gaze into a crackling fire, be it in a cosy country pub or on red dirt under the stars. Good for the soul.




