Folk Federation of NSW AGM Report

The Annual General Meeting of the Folk Federation of NSW was held on Friday 13th July at the Gaelic Club, Surry Hills, with nine members present. New members Nikki and Patrick Kelso were welcomed to their first AGM.

In his report, President Anthony Woolcott noted the year's highlights which include a positive financial outcome, the achievement of DGR (tax deductible gift) status and the establishment of the successful MoFo (Modern Folk) concerts. Anthony also noted the support that the Folk Fed is able to give member organisations by acting as the auspicing body for events and grant applications. Over the past year, assistance has been given in this way to the Northern Beaches Folk Festival, Sing Dubbo, Unaccompanied Baggage *a cappella* concert and the Bright Stars' Singers music development day.

Treasurer Bruce Cameron presented the audited financial report, which shows net assets of \$8429 and a net operating surplus of \$2152. Membership Secretary Wayne Richmond advised that membership numbers have slightly decreased and emphasized the need for consideration to be given to mechanisms for attracting new members and retaining existing members.





Maitland Ball - 25th August 2012

The Bush Music Club's Annual Subscription Ball at the Maitland Town Hall is drawing very close and I thought that I'd give all you wonderful dancers a gentle reminder. The regulars of course will not need this but there is always a warm welcome to those who have not been before. I remember my first time. I was nervous and anxious but pleased that I had taken the opportunity of attending the practice day to learn the dances that were new to me. And at that time of my life that was most of them. I was careful to mark my dance card with the easy ones and leave the "challenging" ones to the experts. Booking partners on my dance card was a bit of a concern but I found that I knew just enough people to see me through the night. I survived to tell the story and was hooked. That was eight years ago and I haven't missed a Maitland Ball since.

What I like about the Maitland Ball is the wonderful atmosphere. It's a total sensory experience made up of the sights, sounds and physical involvement. It's a shared experience as on the dance floor it all comes together.

I love the costumes. The gowns and paraphernalia worn by the ladies and the suits, kilts and uniforms of the gentlemen make a scene to behold. The colours, the textures and designs provide a pageant and spectacle not witnessed too often in our modern world. Let's face it, some of us still like dressing up and playing together.

I love the atmosphere of the historic Town Hall. It's big and it's old and every corner has a sense of its past and the many grand events that it's witnessed. It's not the most beautiful of Maitland's old buildings but it does have one unique feature that makes our whole dancing experience an unforgettable one. It has a sprung dance floor. Yes a multitude of steel coil springs support the structure of the floor and provide that bounce and "give" that makes dancing all night such a great pleasure.

I love the music. There are a number of important factors that make for a good dance and the music is probably the most important of all. Coalbrook Band has played at almost all of the Maitland Balls and their choice of tunes and the high quality of their musicianship makes dancing such a pleasure. Jigs, reels, waltzes and whatever the dance demands they provide in volumes. Nothing is too big a challenge.

I love the meeting and greeting of friends from far off places. People that we only get to see at festivals or balls like this. It's the warm social atmosphere and the more friendships I've made the better I like it. Yes it takes time to feel comfortable with so many but well worth the effort. A dance is not a dance without all the other dancers. It's something that we share and enjoy in good company.

So for me the Maitland Ball is a must do event and this year I anticipate with some excitement the chance to experience its magical atmosphere all over again. Songs for Social Justice: singing together for change

24th - 26th August, 2012

Songs for Social Justice will be a weekend of concerts, workshops and song-sharing circles held in central Sydney from Friday 24 to Sunday 26 August 2012. The aim is share our rich treasury of songs, to create opportunities for activists involved in campaigns for social justice, to learn and share relevant songs, to meet like-minded enthusiasts, and to encourage the use of more music at public rallies and demonstrations – and have fun on the way!

The weekend will begin with a concert on the Friday night upstairs at the Gaelic Club, 64 Devonshire Street, Surry Hills. The events during the day on Saturday and Sunday will take place in Teachers Federation House, 23-33 Mary St, Surry Hills. The program is a multi-stream series of skills-sharing workshops and thematic song-sharing circles on topics such as land rights, migration, coal seam gas, songwriting for causes, songs for keeping hope alive, there'll also be space for unstructured sessions. It will end on Sunday afternoon with a 2 hr concert sharing songs from each of the sessions. (See end of this article for Saturday night activities.)

Artists in the Friday night concert include some interstate performers as well as Sydney folks: Block Harmony, Candy Royalle (TBC) Maurie Mulheron and Jeannie Lewis, Ann Bermingham, Miguel Heatwole, Jenny Fitzgibbon, Peter Hicks and Jumping Fences. There'll only be time for each of them to give a taster of the sorts of songs you can expect to hear more of on Saturday and Sunday.

Among the presenters and facilitators on Saturday and Sunday are: Ann Bermingham, Candy Royalle, Christina Mimmocchi, Ecopella, Jenny Fitzgibbon, John Queripel, Jumping Fences, Karl-Erik Paasonen, Kate Maclurcan, Krista Pav, Lina Cabarero, Margaret Walters, Mithra Cox, Paul Spencer, Peter Hicks and others to be confirmed. Meals: The weekend ticket does not cover meals, but there'll be free tea and coffee, a small donation for biscuits, sandwiches and soup. We'd be grateful if you could bring your own mug. People are welcome to bring their own resources but there will not be access to a kitchen, fridge, stove etc. (NB: No alcohol allowed in Teachers Federation building.)

Accommodation: We hope most people from outside Sydney will be able to sort out their own accommodation but we'll try and match up people having difficulty with people offering billets.

Stalls: Any participants are welcome to bring along any CDs or books they have for sale. And there will be a separate table where you can donate or exchange books and CDs.

Tickets: Cost of the weekend will be \$50/\$35. There are options for Friday night and day tickets. Note – meals and Saturday night activities are not included. We encourage people

to register and buy their tickets in advance as this will assist us in catering and finalising the program.

You can volunteer to work for four hours in exchange for the weekend ticket (or pro rata), and people short of cash and desperate to attend the whole weekend without sacrificing time in volunteering can apply for a limited number of scholarships. Use our web email form to make a request or phone Paul (02) 4952 5889 or Margaret (02) 9698 2206 or contact any of the Committee members.

Any surplus funds will be used to set up a seed fund for next year's event and to contribute to performers' expenses, and hopefully also reward them for their time. Solidarity purchases of tickets by performers are welcome!

In summary: this weekend is very much about participation - so don't expect a music festival where there's a divide between entertainers & audience. The opening concert on the Friday night will be the only one with amplification. Most of the weekend will be devoted to workshops & song-sharing circles & unstructured sessions. We are encouraging all presenters to include chorus songs (providing words & chords where appropriate) and to select a song that typifies their session & include it in the closing concert on Sunday afternoon.

(Note – you won't be bullied into participating if you just want to quietly absorb what's on offer – but we hope you will take advantage of the opportunity to learn lots of songs, and how to create some of your own.)

No events are scheduled for Saturday night. However, we have some suggestions for two or three sympathetic activities after the events finish at Teachers Federation House. There will be a chill-out and session at Humanist Hall, Shepherd St, Chippendale (just near Broadway); and/or a night at the Loaded Dog Folk Club at the Annandale Neighbourhood Centre, 79 Johnston St, Annandale where Melbourne singer songwriter Bruce Watson and friends will be presenting songs of unsung Australian heroes; there will be a 30-minute segment during the evening devoted to some of the singers from the Songs for Social Justice weekend.



Waltzing Matilda

The Secret History of Australia's Favourite Song Dennis O'Keefe, Allen & Unwin, 2012, p 294.

This book took a long time to reach publication, but it was worth the wait. Many years of dedicated research and the passionate, thoughtful interest of Dennis O'Keefe has produced an Australian publication of great importance.


This book is a lot more than the poem and subsequent song versions that evolved from Banjo Paterson and Christina Macpherson. It is about the history and development of the Australian character, the painful and slow birth of the trade union movement, the hardships endured by the squatter class and the tactics of both groups, and how close we came to experiencing the worst war of all, a civil war. It contains elements of violence, arson and murder. It is also a story of romance, both in human and nationalistic senses. The personalities of many of the key players in the story are covered in detail, much of it obtained from direct descendants through personal interviews conducted by the author. Apparently the Banjo was quite a lad with the ladies!

Most Australians accept Waltzing Matilda as our folk anthem and unofficial national anthem and many an eye has been moisten by the singing of it in all parts of the world – often when the song has been an impromptu event. The author's description of Australian soldiers charging to their obvious doom, all singing Waltzing Matilda, is also an eye moistening experience for those who have already read this book.

How this simple poem coupled with a Scottish tune quickly became such a popular song is a fascinating story. It is also interesting to discover to what degree the legendary Billy Tea Company contributed to its popularity. To many, the beautiful tune Thou Bonnie Hills of Craigielea is associated with almost non-sensible lyrics in the song Waltzing Matilda. Dennis O'Keefe explains to the reader the various lyric changes and the background to these lines. The subtitle mentions the 'secret history' and it would be unprofessional for a reviewer to expand and disclose some of these previously generally unknown facts. As an old bloke said to me many years ago, 'No one would commit suicide for killing a sheep,' and he was correct in that statement.

Dennis O'Keefe is a well known Australian performer of traditional folk songs. He is a singer-songwriter and a songwriting teacher. He is a multi instrumentalist and for many years has run the popular Australian Song Sessions at the National Folk Festival held in Canberra every Easter. Many readers will enjoy the many traditional songs and poems that provide artistic support for the text content. Not all poems and songs are in their entirety and not all are traditional, as Dennis uses some of his own compositions for illustration.

My reading of the book picked up only a couple of errors. The passing description of a cabbage tree hat, page 86, leaves (no pun intended) the uninitiated an incorrect idea of the universal headwear of the early Australian. As was usual in places of minimum resources, people had to make do with that which was available. For example, in the outback where trees did not offer the bark properties of the inside country, bark huts were replaced with bough sheds with the use of thatched cane grass, coolabah leaves and the like. The cabbage tree hats were woven from coastal palms (Cordyline australis and Livistona australis) and their production became what today



would be called a cottage industry. The hats varied in shape and size, but were generally finely plaited from the leaves, often with a high crown and wide brim. On page 85 the term 'bullock trails' are mentioned. The use of the word trails was not used by the bushmen of the past, nor is it used today, except by National Park bureaucrats and such, those whose education was United States or flickering screen based. That slip by the author appears to be just that, a slip, as his use of the Australian language is otherwise exceptional, as one would expect from such an expert on our culture.

The publication contains copious note sources, photographs and sketch reproductions, an impressive bibliography, an index, and a brief but disturbing preface.

This book offers so much more than the exciting story of our famous song and the explanations of the words Matilda, swagman, squatter and the evolution of mateship. It is more than Paterson's early embarrassing female relationships and its consequences. It gives the background to our developing nation; it covers a great deal of country, from Victoria's Western Districts to the far outback of Western Queensland and beyond. Dennis O'Keefe's Waltzing Matilda covers a wide spectrum of Australian politics, folklore and history and I believe it is a book that should take a prominent position on the bookshelf of Australian literature. It is essential reading for all Australians be they school students, those seeking information on our history and folklore, and for those that already have a profound knowledge of our heritage. As the blurb says, 'Waltzing Matilda is as important to Australian culture as the Eureka Stockade and Ned Kelly'.

Rain In The Mountains: Songs From Henry Lawson

Christine Wheeler and Friends


The power of Henry Lawson's writing is that within conventional poetic structure he leads readers into depths of imagination which were no doubt challenging during his own lifetime and which remain to haunt us today. Ranking beside those who see more deeply into the human spirit, Lawson created timeless statements that brook no argument. He was one reason, perhaps the main one, why a young country could come so quickly to feel so deeply.

A man who understood bush and city life at a time when both were still half formed, Lawson perhaps envisaged the nation already emerging and set about sinking Australia's emotional guideposts early in its development. The project by Christine Wheeler and Friends, Rain In The Mountains: Songs from Henry Lawson, was therefore always destined to be a bold initiative. Many have paid tribute to Lawson's achievement: George Robertson, Miles Franklin, Max Cullen, The Laggan Poets, Leonard Teale. It is a measure of the finesse of Wheeler's venture that a clear declaration is possible. An important addition to the Lawson canon has arrived.

This finely crafted album deserves international recognition, and will no doubt find it. The songs themselves will offer overseas listeners, perhaps less familiar with Lawson, a joyful introduction to his writing; seldom are texts set so delightfully to music. And for those already engaged, Rain In The Mountains once again brings Lawson and his subject matter to life with relevance and musical integrity.

Every base is covered, in fact, in this album's instrumentation and arrangements. Often complex, they always combine comfortably and confidently. Guitars, pipes, flutes, accordion, strings, percussion and bouzouki blend into easy authenticity. Andy Busuttil's darabuka, djembe, tapan and seedpod contribute a pleasing touch of the exotic. Gary Daley's piano accordion achieves a similar result on Do You Think That I Do Not Know? in an unexpected but appealing echo of a Parisian street scene, implying a worldliness that takes this recording much further than the signpost to Mudgee. Mudgee itself (the name means Nest In The Hills), where Lawson spent much of his life, is charmingly acknowledged in Wheeler's arrangement of The Mudgee Waltz for When The Children Come Home.

Celtic themes are handled with taste and accomplishment in Leigh Birkett's several instruments and his harmony vocals. Nowhere is the whole greater than the sum of the parts than in The Route March, for which Wheeler has placed Lawson's original text in the traditional Scottish melody Return From



Fingal to paint a poignant image of horror and innocence, all the more powerful in Lawson's characteristic understatement.

The Katoomba launch was an enjoyably relaxed affair, and telling for the number of accomplished musicians it attracted who were not directly involved. It risks running a little close to cliché to describe Wheeler's voice as a definitive English language folk voice. Nevertheless, it is. It combines sweetness and power and provides the perfect vehicle for these expert adaptations of Lawson's writing. Its innocence complements his irony superbly, for example, in The Route March.

Encased in the artwork of Leigh Birkett, who also co-arranged much of the album with Wheeler and Rebecca Daniel, and co-produced all of it, Rain In The Mountains offers rich imagery as well as fine music: the call of the nurturing bush heard from a railway cutting; the false promise of jingoism; a mother's fear in times before text messaging, when a son's departure to go droving may mean the last time she'd see him; the strange, seasonless place where women sometimes go when hope seems lost; man's inability to be truthful to himself, and the slow destruction this wreaks on his life. Lawson's words remain profoundly relevant and evocative today.

Above all, these recordings are the real thing, perpetuating the great days of Australian folklore, the pathos of Lloyd and the mirth of Wyndham-Read. If no other tribute had ever been made to the achievement of Australia's bard, this one would do very well indeed. A labour of love and an undoubted contender for folk album of the year (and not just within Australia), Rain In The Mountains carries contemporary folk music to the sophistication it deserves.




