

Jacko (Anthony) Kevans (1942-2005)



Being fellow 'old Canberrans', my partner Phil and I had known of Jacko for many years before we actually met him. About fifteen years ago we moved to live in a subtropical forest setting on the north coast, as Jack had done earlier, and I started playing concertina. Jack became a warm friend to us both, reminiscing about our Canberran youth, swapping stories about the much loved wildlife in our forest homes, sharing produce (our fruit and vegies and Nimbin dried bananas), and encouraging me with my concertina playing.

I have seen Jack's passion for nature drawn upon to help uplift people he knew were unwell or experiencing difficult times – he would engage them with nature by pointing out a beautiful coloured butterfly or bird. He gave accordions away to some kids who turned up at his workshops and showed natural talent and enthusiasm, but had no chance of getting an accordion themselves.

At his numerous accordion, concertina and Australian tune workshops at various festivals Jack displayed incredible patience, encouragement, generosity and caring as a teacher. Can you imagine anything more trying than a room full of beginners squawking away on their boxes! He ran workshops year after year at Maleny and Woodford, even going ahead with Woodford this year when he had only just found out how sick he was. Once again there we all were – young and old and everything in between, ranging from beginners to much more experienced. Always Jack gently shared his wealth of music and musical skills with each and every one of us.

I feel incredibly privileged that circumstances found me amongst the lucky people who played tunes with Jack in his last couple of weeks. His love of music and nature, his kindness and his inspiration live on in so many people.

Tributes to Jacko (Anthony) Kevans

(1942-2005)

Jacko (Anthony) Kevans' passing is a big loss, he was an outstanding folk musican. He was involved in the folk scene in a big way back in the late 1960s playing in the Monaro Boys with Bob McInnes and Jim Fingelton based in Canberra. He was very involved in the first National, the 4th National, The Port Jackson Folk Festival, the Monaro Folk Music Society and often appeared in Sydney and Newcastle folk clubs and concerts. He spent a lot of time in and around Sydney and was a core member of Warren Faheys Larrikins. He was a great linguist speaking many languages. He was a dazzling piano accordion player.

Jacko is survived by children Keiran and Kate and brother Denis.

It was a privilege for Ruth and me to attend Jacko's funeral at Nimbin on Thursday. He was laid to rest in idyllic surroundings on a beautiful sunny afternoon with his beloved rainforest hills in the background and cattle grazing in lush green pastures adjacent to the cemetery.

Around Jacko's open coffin positioned under a shady tree (with an accordion and a cricket bat alongside) we enjoyed beautiful music and song in the open air, plus many verbal tributes by those present including his son Kieran and daughter Kate, and an inspiring eulogy by his brother Denis interspersed with his own poetry, some verses composed specially in honour of Jacko.

Many photographs depicting the various facets of Jacko's life were spread around for those present to enjoy and reflect upon.

Denis led us through much of the Kevans family history in Sydney and Canberra - not all rosy by any means - with touches of pathos and of humour that typified Jacko's whole life in many respects.

Denis also recalled Jacko's musical development during the sixties in Canberra, bringing back wonderful memories of 'The Monaro Boys' - rough and ready as we were but of which I was proud to be a part!

The coffin was then covered and carried a short distance to the prepared grave accompanied by a lone fiddler. Prior to that we sang 'The Parting Glass'a glass filled with many tears on Thursday in the sunshine and the gathering afternoon shadows at Nimbin cemetery.

It was a most moving send-off. I also should mention that there was a great session at the Tuntable Falls Community Hall following the funeral.

Unfortunately I had to leave while the music was in full flight and drive back to Brisbane.

Bugger !! Jacko would have been in his element.......

Woodford Ticket Changes

Buy early, online. The Woodford Folk Festival (Old) at New Year has been growing at such a great rate that, to allow organisers to cope, ticket sales will be capped in future. Prices are increasing by 10%, and there will be a nominal entry fee for children 6-12. Ticket release times have changed, and will all be on the website: the first round (20% off) from 21st April; when all sold, the second round (15% off); and finally the third (10% off). The website will show the number of unsold tickets. Overnight camping and day/evening tickets will be online from 1st November, and will not be transferable to other days. To avoid long gate queues, purchasers can download and print their bar-coded e-ticket. There will be a 5% surcharge for phone orders; and mail order will not be available. The program will be published at the end of October. www.woodfordfolkfestival.com

Peggy Seeger's 70th

From www.folking.com: Peggy Seeger will celebrate her 70th birthday on stage at the Queen Elizabeth Hall in London on 29th May 2005, joined by her brothers, Mike and Pete Seeger. The concert will be the first time that Peggy, Pete and Mike have ever performed together in the UK and may be one of the last opportunities to see the three on the same stage anywhere in the world. Among those also joining her on stage will be Norma Waterson, Martin Carthy, Peggy's sons Neill and Calum MacColl, her daughter Kitty MacColl and her partner Irene Pyper Scott

Peggy and her husband Ewan MacColl were a legendary force within British folk music. They were responsible for the development of *The Radio Ballads* and Peggy was the "face" that inspired Ewan's classic song *First Time Ever I Saw Your Face*. The astonishing breadth of Peggy's songs can be seen in their range and influence: *Gonna Be An Engineer* became an anthem for the feminist movement, while her *Ballad of Springhill* was covered by U2.

The concert marks the launch of a trilogy of new CDs – the Home collection. These are a collection of traditional songs that Peggy has sung all her life but rarely, if ever, recorded until now. The first two, *Heading for Home* and *Love Call Me Home*, will be released in the UK to coincide with the concert. The third, *She's Coming Home*, will be out next year.

Dance Winner

Don Richmond, Bush Music Club President, reports on this year's dance writing competition, where entries were invited to match the Railway tunes that had appeared in previous issues of Mulga Wire. John Short was the winner, with his Railway Polka. John's Railway Waltz, to the tune The Sydney Railway Waltz, was Highly Commended. (WH Paling composed the music, for the occasion of the official opening in 1855 of the first rail in NSW, from Sydney to Parramatta.) And another win for John - the TSDAV Newsletter (May 2005) published his Twelvesome Reel, an easy social dance for six couples, which won their 2005 Dance Composer's Competition for Section A: "General Social Dance including Children's Dances".

Family Fashions

In *Mulga Wire* (April 2005), Bob Bolton has reviewed an interesting book for anyone wanting to see Australian clothing styles, 1860s to 1950s. *Dressed in Their Best: 100 Years of Family Photos*, by Pam Liell, has over 500 photos from her collection, mostly of her family. (Bob also recommends *Duck and Cabbage Tree* [later *Clothes in Australia*], Cedric Flower, A&R, 1968; and *Breeches and Bustles*, Elizabeth Scandrett, Pioneer Design, 1978.) Liell's book, self-published, with some assistance from the City of Canada Bay Council, is available from her at PO Box 455, Concord West 2138, for \$20.

Dance Manuals

Noted in TSDAV Newsletter (May 2005): An American Ballroom Companion at http://rs6.loc.gov/ammem/dihtml/dihome. html presents a collection of over 200 social dance manuals held at the American Library of Congress. The list begins with a rare late 15th-century source, Les basses danses de Marguerite d'Autriche (c.1490) and ends with Ella Gardner's 1929 Public dance halls, their regulation and place in the recreation of adolescents. Most illuminate the manner in which people have joyfully expressed themselves as they dance for and with one another. There are ballroom dances, cotillons, country dances, and much more. Along with dance instruction manuals, many with full text, this online presentation also includes a number of antidance manuals, histories, treatises on etiquette, etc.

This is one of the dance manuals on the American Library of Congress website. Published in 1798 in Norwich (USA), "it provides nine figures for the cotillon, a precursor to the quadrille, consisting of a series of figures known as changes that were performed alternately with the cotillon figure. The manual also gives the figures for 79 English country dances, a popular group dance performed by a column of men facing a column of women."

Fiddle festival proves instrumental to fun

THERE are more than 1000 of us and almost everyone is carrying a violin case - it's enough to put a twinkle in a mafia don's eye. But this is a microcosm of Australia's burgeoning fiddle community, a gathering of the violin-playing tribes from just about every musical genre. The only thing getting shot down is the myth that fiddling is a minority sport.

We're at Clarendon, NSW, for the fifth annual Hawkesbury National Fiddle Festival and the rosin dust flies all day long and well into the night. Forget the imagery the word fiddle usually conjures. There's no hokey screeching here, although there is some virtuosic "Texas hokum" from Victoria-based brothers Donal and Andy Baylor. There's also jazz, blues, swing, gypsy, bluegrass and traditional and contemporary folk fiddling from some of the top musos in the country, including George Washingmachine, Nigel McLean, the Transylvaniacs, the Wise family folk band from Western Australia and Marcus Holden's eclectic group, Fiddlers Festival, from which the Hawkesbury gathering

The Festival is an opportunity for fiddlers young and old, amateur and professional, to make music together. Holden describes the event as a teaching festival, with workshops a big drawcard. "You don't have to be a genius on the instrument to enjoy it," he says. "This is where the classical regime fails. You'll get to 18 and, uness you're a genius and you've dedicated yourself to a very narrow path, there's not a career for you." The assembled fiddlers are a diverse bunch: campers and daytrippers, school students with and without teachers, fiddling families, adult learners and gifted youngsters seeking the path to a professional career. Charlie Palmer-Love, 13, is one of 34 members of the combined string ensemble from the Hervey Bay and Urangan high schools in Queensland. The 17-hour bus trip was worth it, she says. "I've learned a lot of new techniques and how to sing and play the violin at the same time," she says. "I love country music now. I never used to like it, never used to touch it, but it's really nice and so's jazz. Oh, and I got a hug from George Washingmachine; that was definitely the highlight for me." Ensemble conductor Kim Morley says the festival experience

will have a big influence on the school music program. "Most of the time we're doing classical music, a bit of Gershwin jazz and the odd Irish tune," he says. "So coming down here is opening up a world of music they haven't heard before." Sally Biskupic of Granville, NSW, told her husband to babysit their three children while she came to find out what's beyond the Suzuki classical violin method. "I've realised that this is where my heart is - in the Scottish music, in the Irish music, in the jazz and the swing, and all that kind of stuff," she says. "I'll keep going with the classical to learn technique, but I'm definitely going to keep exploring the other things as well." She's also enjoying the camaraderie among the adult learners. "I wanted to go to a workshop where I wasn't the only adult - I wasn't expecting that there'd be so many other people here just like me who have started out later on in life," she says. And she's not intimidated by the talented teens sitting next to her in the workshops. "You just accept that you're in a different league and you're there for a different reason," she says. Although the festival is a hands-on learning experience, it's also about having fun with the fiddle - or without it. Friday night we hear the session at a nearby tavern won't be happening, so a group of us descends on the tent of Queenslandbased luthier David Guscott to find out if his home-brewing talents are as good as his electric violin-making skills. (They are.) And on Saturday, the Transylvaniacs make up for the relatively quiet first night, keeping the campers entertained with a rousing gypsy-fiddle jam that dances on and on through the wee hours. About 60 fiddlers gather on Sunday for a mass fiddle rally, which festival director Lucia Okumura hopes will grow. It's her dream to break the world record for the largest fiddle orchestra. She has quite a way to go to beat the record, set in London in 1925, of 4000 players. But, as the rapid rise of the fiddle continues in Australia, she's confident she won't be waiting too long. They have called this presentation of Australia's best loved songs, ballads, stories and poems 'Wallaby Stew'. Neil Morrison had originally performed a successful oneman show as a recitationist, then in 2002, he invited Penelope Grace, a violinist, to collaborate with him by providing an accompaniment of new and traditional music to fit the mood or highlight the drama, resulting in a show that is both informative and entertaining. Included will be some of the poetry of Henry Lawson, CJ Dennis, Dame Mary Gilmore, Lance Skuthorpe, and many others, including Anonymous! This should be a most interesting night. Don't miss it



DECLAN AFFLEY

A rake and rambling man



Declan Affley's sudden death on the 27th June, 1985, at the age of 45, shocked everyone who knew and admired him as a person and an outstanding folk singer and musician.

Declan was born in Cardiff, South Wales, 8th September, 1939, to an Irish/Welsh Catholic working class family. The Affleys were from Cork and his mother, mainly descended from Welsh miners, also had some Cork ancestry. Declan grew up in Splott, where many of the extended family lived. He attended St Alban's and later St.Illtyd's Catholic Schools,

but maintained they "didn't produce lasting damage". Irish Catholics tended to stick together in predominantly Methodist Wales and many family holidays were spent in Cork. Later the family moved to Rumney.

Declan excelled at the clarinet and was in the St.Alban's band, which played for many events, including football games in Cardiff Arms Park. Later he was a member of the Cardiff College of Music's orchestra. Aged sixteen, after completing his Leaving Certificate, he joined the British Merchant Navy.

Some of Declan's earliest memories were of his dad playing the Scots pipes at St. Patrick's Day marches and attending Irish Ceilidhs at St. David's Parish hall. His father listened to traditional Irish music on RTE, Ireland's public broadcaster, and sang at many functions. Declan learnt many songs from him including 'Crushkeen Lan'.

In 1956, on his first visit to Japan, as a seaman, he purchased "a hideous machine somewhat resembling a guitar", and taught himself to play, and accompany himself on folksongs.

Declan rose to the rank of Second Mate before jumping ship and coming to live in Australia in 1959. He told me he'd fallen in love with Geraldton in WA, when his ship docked there. Based in Sydney he worked on east coast ships as an AB (able bodied seaman).

Whilst on shore leave he sang in 'low dives and pubs', such as the Royal George, Sydney and Tattersalls in Melbourne. Irish rebel songs and other folksongs were sung with great gusto in these pubs and it was here that Declan met singers such a Brian Mooney, Don Ayrton, Paul Marks and Martin Wyndham-Read.

Declan eventually became a regular performer at the Troubadour Coffee Lounge in Edgecliff, Sydney and later at Frank Traynor's Folk Club, Melbourne. He was also a frequent guest at the 'Greenwich Village', the Elizabeth Hotel – 'the Liz', Pact Folk, Edinburgh Castle and other Sydney folk venues. He also became a stalwart of the first folk clubs in pubs in Melbourne in the late 1960s such as Fogarty's – according to John O'Leary, Declan, after singing for most of the opening Saturday afternoon, received the princely sum of \$4.00, and later the Dan O'Connell Hotel, Carlton.

He was also a familiar face at national and local folk festivals and toured Indonesia, New Guinea and New Zealand.

Irish music sessions included the Gaelic Club and Wentworth Park Hotel, Ultimo, with hospitable publicans, Tommy and Joan Doyle. Declan played and socialised with many Irish musicians. He was well known for his singing, his deep resonant voice, subtle guitar accompaniments, which he said were based on an appreciation of the Irish Harp, and for witty, pithy commentaries between songs. Ardent about traditional music, in particular the Irish, he also sang many British Isles songs, and was interested in a wide variety of musical styles. His extensive repertoire also included Australian and New Zealand traditional songs and songs by contemporary songwriters such as Don Henderson, Harry Robertson and John Dengate.

He was creative in his interpretation of folksongs. The transportation ballad 'Jim Jones' was usually sung to an upbeat tempo but by slowing it right down Declan highlighted its strong rebellious and dramatic tone. He's probably best remembered for his rendition of Irish folk song 'Carrickfergus', although he also had a special affinity with songs such as 'An bunnan Bui – The Yellow Bittern' and 'Do you think that I do no know', a Henry Lawson poem, set to music by Chris Kempster.

As well as guitar, Declan played tin whistle and banjo and in 1967 taught himself the fiddle from tapes of Irish fiddle player Johnny Doherty.

In 1970 Sydney's Irish community lent Declan a B flat set of uillean pipes made by Harrington of Cork. This event marked a major turning point in his musical career. In Ireland uillean pipe playing was part of a continuing tradition, but in Australia Declan was isolated. He contacted oboe players for hints on reed making, where to buy cane, generally pestering anyone who could help him. The pipes became his passion - he was forever fixing them up - forever trying to make the perfect reed. He would say - "Listen Burkie I've got it!- Ah, I'll just take a little bit off here and here. Wrecked. Back to square one."

In 1972 he toured Ireland with Peter O'Shaugnessy and Marion Henderson in *The Restless Years*, a dramatic production of Australian history illustrated by stories, poems, folksongs and anecdotes based on the award winning ABC TV program, which he also sang and played in. Their starting point was the Dublin Theatre Festival

Some of the Irish pipers that Declan most admired were Seamus Ennis, Willie Clancy and Dan Dowd. Whilst in Dublin he sought out Dan Dowd and spent hours with him learning how to make reeds and the intricacies of the pipes. We also spent a night with Willie Clancy locked in a pub in Milltown Malbay, Clare.

Blessed with the gift of the gab Declan could discourse for hours on topics as diverse as history, music, politics, cricket and all footy codes.

Profoundly egalitarian he scorned all pretension and bullshit, was modest about his achievements, and never sought fame or money for his music. He had the rare ability to share his musical knowledge and to inspire others. He encouraged people to sing and play, passing on musical skills to anyone who was interested.

In 1984/5 Declan taught fiddle and banjo at the Eora Centre, an Aboriginal Cultural Centre in Redfern, Sydney.

As well as being involved in radio and TV programs, Declan also appeared in several films including Peter Weir's *The Last Wave*, and Richard Lowenstein's *Strikebound*, where he was musical director as well as having an acting role and singing songs such as "The blackleg miner".

An exceptional solo performer, Declan also played with many bands. He started the group 'The Wild Colonial Boys' in Melbourne in 1969, which combined Irish and Australian music. He convinced Bob McInnes, Jim Fingleton (Canberra) and Jacko Kevans (then Sydney based) to put their lives on hold and move to Melbourne to join the band. The other band member was Irish singer Tony Lavin. 'The Wild Colonial Boys' became the standard model for many successive Aussie folk bands.

Declan and band members appeared in Tony Richardson's 'Ned Kelly' film.

Although not a joiner of political parties or groups, Declan described himself as a socialist, and always gave generously of his time, and musical skills for causes he believed in. He was outspoken on many issues, in particular, Irish, Australian and other traditional/ethnic music and politics.

For his performance of political/ satirical songs he was often subject to warnings and censorship. He was banned from lunchtime concerts in Martin Place, Sydney, after singing 'The dying treasurer' by John Dengate. However, bans and censorship never deterred Declan, merely reinforcing his commitment to sing such songs in public. He'd never turn his back on such a challenge.

Journeys Colcannon



Let me say right at the start that I would walk barefoot over broken biscuits for *Kat Kraus*, and in the years I've been listening to

'Colcannon' they have gone from strength to strength through honest work.

This new and most welcome album begins and ends with anthemic tunes, and, in between, touches on the band's longstanding interests in writing their own material and finding the songs of others that resonate with their own loves. But to go from The Judas Trap, a macabre account of a murderous farming practice to The Border and especially that 'wish you were here' postcard Carry Me Away is a bit of a jolt. The final tune is Carly Simon's Let the River Run, a powerful and exhilarating song I can't wait to hear live. It also shows off the band's really inventive vocal harmonies. I worry a bit, just a bit about Kat's voice right at the bottom of the register, but that's just me.

Journeys reflects in many ways the epic British tour the band undertook last year, something like three hundred concerts in six hundred venues in two months..(well I'm exaggerating) but the pressure and the playing has led to some fine new songs

The political consciousness is still there in such songs as John Munro's *My Only Son* and *Stand Up* where his skills as a writer of deep but simply expressed convictions are radiant, but also in the Stephen Stills *Find the Cost of Freedom* Don Holdernesse's parting gift to the group is blended in the bass playing and the production: evidently he found something in his journey that has taken him away. Bon voyage.

Colcannon have always managed to sing music that in other lives, by other bands, would be mawkishly tear jerking by letting the words and music do their work. Just listen to their a cappella version of David Francey's Torn Screen Door, about bankrupted farmers, and their own song Bless this House, with Emma Luker co-writing with John Munro. This is serious emotion with beautifully balanced sentimental weight behind every note.

In short while nothing beats *Colcannon* live, this latest album is a winner for me, and I can't wait to get my hands on their version of *The Eureka Suite*Ewart Shaw

La Mer Jolie – Acadian Songs Suzie Leblanc

ATMA ACD2 2330 (ROCKIAN)



The Acadians arrived in Nova Scotia in the 17th century, only to be expelled or imprisoned by the Brits in the 18th century. Some went down

south all the way to Louisiana, others who escaped slowly re-established themselves up north in the maritime provinces of Canada. The music and culture that developed from then was influenced by the Scottish, Irish and Portuguese, which shows in this collection of songs and instrumental dance tunes.

Suzie LeBlanc is well-known as an opera singer but is a native of Acadia, so in a radical departure from her usual repertoire, she is going back to her roots as it were. Here she is accompanied by a classy ensemble that crosses over from folk to classical, with David Greenberg on violin, Chris Norman on flutes, David McGuinness on harmonium and harpsichord, Sylvain Bergeron on guitar, and Betsy MacMillan on viola da gamba. Pierre Chartand provides occasional stepdancing and plays bones.

The result is a pleasant and uplifting journey into some unusual repertoire, even if some of it sounds familiar. Suzie LeBlanc's sweet expressive voice is nicely suited to this repertoire of French ballads and laments. They have an attractive rhythmic lilt that often conjures up the Mediterranean, with sometimes tragic subject matter set against a backdrop of water or woods. The lively instrumentals have a distinct Scots-Irish flavour. The arrangements sound quite spontaneous, but clearly have the stamp of professionals at work – the harmonium is particularly evocative.

Add to this a clear warm sound to make it a real winner.
