

The Rainforest ambience of the Jamberoo Valley Lodge will be a far cry from their remote and windswept homeland when the Faeroe Island Band, Kvonn stop off from their world tour to perform to Foothills audiences.

The Faeroes are an island group (18) off the North West tip of Scotland about half way between Norway and Iceland. With a population of just 48,000 they largely go ignored by mainstream events. The band Kvonn, a lively group of musicians, play traditional and contemporary folk music from Scandinavia, are helping to change that. KVONN's repertoire includes music composed by the band members, as well as traditional tunes and music from the 18th century notebook of Faroese musician and scholar Jens Chr. Syabo.

But Kvonn are only one of fifteen groups or performers that will be part of the Festival. Other performers include Double Entendre from Western Australia, Enda Kenny from Melbourne, Allan Johnston (Scotland), Brent Parlane, John Broomhall Trio, Chloe & Jason Roweth, Nick Rheinberger, The Song Catchers, Replay, Vivienne Sawyer, Alegras Andinas, Sin Fronteras, Wollongong Welsh Choir and No Such Thing. The venue is the beautiful Jamberoo Valley Lodge which is nestled among the rainforest at the base of the Illawarra Escarpment. Turn at Jamberoo into Jamberoo Mountain Road. The Second Kangaroo Valley Folk Festival

Patchy drizzle and rain on Saturday, and mild sunny weather on Sunday, made for more amenable conditions for the second Kangaroo Valley Folk Festival over the weekend of 7-9 September than we had last year for the inaugural Kanga event.

Club President Peter Watson and the event organisers from the Shoalhaven Folk Club made up a full festival program which really did have something for everyone. Concert performances happened in the three marquees on the showground, at the Uniting Church nearby, and at several businesses in the township including the well-named Friendly Inn Hotel just up the road where some excellent sessioning took place to the immense delight of the large well behaved crowd of locals, festival patrons and tourists. Hard to tell if the crowd was bigger or smaller than last year's, because of the kinder weather let people linger out of doors.

The high point of this festival for me was the beautiful performance in the Uniting Church by John Warner, Margaret Waters, Kate Delaney, Sonia Bennet, Don Brian and Tom Hansen of the moving verse and song cycle "Yarri of Wiradjuri", written by John Warner in 1997 to celebrate the heroism of Yarri and other Wiradjuri people during the great flood at Gundagai in 1852

A recording is available of "Yarri of Wiradjuri" by a full cast which includes John Derum as narrator and Matthew Doyle on didgeridoo, Chris Wheeler flute and Tony Pyrzakowski fiddle and viola. Among the other acts which greatly impressed was the polished performance by Canberra's own Craig and Simone. One in the audience observed that the musicianship of this talented duo has reached new heights. The very entertaining performance which included some new songs, and selections from Craig Dawson's lovely new cd album "Tunes from the Rivers", had the audience spellbound.

Bill Bekric is one of our favourite contemporary folk singers, who gave us a gently engaging performance that captivated his audience, especially by his renditions of John Denver's Some Days Are Diamonds and Charlie Landsborough's What Colour Is the Wind? You could hear

a pin drop during Bill's original song My Valentine Deserves More Than Roses (My Valentine Deserves Better Than Me) which reminds us of what love should be -

Madrigala from Braidwood are a group of seven women who love singing madrigals. Merrilyn Simmons, Sue Irving, Peg, Natalie, Janine, Kate and Wendy gave a stirring performance that was well received.

Avalanche is a newly formed bluegrasss outfit from the Illawarra, led by vocalist/ mandolin player Heather Mandich - and I gotta tell you, these boys and a girl are hot! One in the audience reckoned they played a bit too fast at times, the tempo erratic, and too loud according to another patron. But they gave us a lovely version of If Wishes Were Horses, and Emmylou herself would have been proud of their sensitive rendition of the Wayfaring Stranger. They gave the best version of Muleskinner Blues that I've heard since the Fendermen did it all those decades ago. I thought they demonstrated great musicianship, tight playing and good arrangements, an interesting playlist and a very well rehearsed act. All in all, Avalanche gave a most impressive and entertaining performance. Let's hope we see - and hear! - lot more of Avalanche. coming soon, I hope, to a venue nearby!

Still in the fields of bluegrass (yuk! yuk!) the Lawnmowers formed in 2003 were a big hit with Kanga festival-goers last year, and this year their performance surpassed our expectations. With the addition of ace harmonica player Tony Ayers, their musicianship has become good to the point of being relentlessly driving, fast and at least for me, somewhat exhausting - high voltage bluegrass, you might well say, since they play like greased lightning. After a while I found myself longing to hear them do a slow (or slower!) number. But the applause was loud and long, and richly deserved I'm sure. Besides Tony we had Dave Hellens on banjo (who has been three times national banjo champ!) and Robbie Long on guitar.

"Broommhall, De Santi and Spillane" are a trio of master musicians who presented vintage folk.. John Broomhall is a well known musical commentator about the Aussie landscape and condition, with many fine songs and recordings to his credit; Dave is the driving force behind Wongawilli and a musician for MFS

and other balls, and John is the highly regarded whistler of celtic folk band Madd Marianne, a festival favourite that sadly is no longer available for bookings.



From shower to showtime singing is cool again











EVEN their names have a melodious ring: the Sweet Adelines, the Bright Star Singers, A Choired Taste and, most fittingly in Sydney, the Leichhardt Espresso and the Circular Keys Chorus.

Community **choirs**, says the director of the Espressos, Michelle Leonard, have struck a perfect chord. Singing was "almost trendy", she said.

"People used to look at you as though you had some sort of disease," Ms Leonard said. "Now you can out yourself. The level of public awareness in the past 12 months has boomed."

Community **choirs** bring people together, start social relationships and quickly demonstrate how people care for each other, said Ms Leonard, whose youngest choir member is 15 and her oldest in his 70s.

Australian Idol, ABC radio's **choirs** competition and more lately the national broadcaster's television hit Choir of Hard Knocks have all contributed to the growing delight that people feel when they sing in public.

At Glenbrook, in the lower Blue Mountains, Viv Llewellyn, a musical director renowned for his showmanship, said he had seen the steady growth of community **choirs** over the past 10 years.

"I am looking at the latest edition of the Cornstalk Gazette, the journal of the Folk Federation of NSW," he said. "There used to be two or three **choirs** advertised. Now there is a column full of them: A Choired Taste in Glebe, the Bright Star Singers at Ashfield, the Glory Bound Groove Train at Petersham, the People's Chorus at Newcastle, the Sydney Trade Union Choir, Voiceworks at Katoomba ..."

A new singing group had just started in the Blue Mountains, a youth choir that was yet to have its first rehearsal. "Virtually anybody can sing or be taught to sing," he said. "But whether they want to, whether they are able to is another matter."

In so many cases, exposure to school **choirs** had a strong influence, but community **choirs** have always been around.

They were the voice of the people, formed spontaneously during the great

protest movements of the 1960s ("We shall not be moved") and have withstood the invasion of rock and electronic gadgetry.

"Maybe the formation of **choirs** is a reaction to all that," Mr Llewellyn said.

The president of the Sydney Welsh Choir, Clive Woosnam, said that there had been a push several years ago in Walesto project a new image forthe region - art galleries and rock bands were on the up -and to muffle Wales's legendary **choirs**.

"But the harder they tried to suppress them, the more popular they became," he said. "**Choirs** are now back in, and the same thing is happening in Australia."

Research in Scandinavia had shown that people who say in **choirs** live longer, Mr Woosnam said, quickly warming to his favourite subject.

"And there is no question of their appeal." The Cremorne Orpheum had broken records with its screening of As It Is In Heaven, and it had beaten every film including the Titanic, he said.

"It is about a choir in Sweden. I watched it for the second time and some people there were watching it for the fifth time.

"The fastest ever selling classical music CD in Britain: Voices from the Valleys by the Froncysyllte Male Choir [The Fron], an amateur choir with an average age of 60-plus."

At Castle Hill, members of the Circular Keys Chorus, part of the Australian Chapter of the Sweet Adelines, a women's choral network, were practising this week. The chorus was formed 11 years ago and has up to 80 members. The 50 or so at practice were joined by 17 who were preparing for auditions.

A spokeswoman for the choir, Deborah Martin, said: "It is surprising how many people are doing it out there. There are so many a capella [singing without accompaniment] **choirs**." The chorus had organised a membership drive last month and had attracted 50 hopefuls.

Heather Finch, tiring of always being a church organist and never a singer, joined the Circular Keys five years ago.

"I am fond of saying I joined for the singing and stayed for the friendship," she said

Publishing and regularly updating the Australian Folk Directory. - This is a comprehensive print and on-line resource of folk contacts available to members and non-members alike.

Releasing four double compilation CDs in 2000, 2002, 2004 and 2005, successfully promoting original folk artists nationally and overseas across diverse styles.

Initiating properly funded support to showcase Australian folk artists overseas.

Why do we need a national folk organisation? We live in a country which puts a relatively low value on artistic and cultural pursuits in general, and on folklore in particular. To change this political culture we need the FAA to represent our views to government and policy makers.

Why does FAA need you? FAA has an ambitious agenda ahead of it, in particular to establish its credibility as a key national music organisation. To this, FAA needs members who will make their views known, provide a sounding board for plans and projects and participate in FAA events.

FAA's Annual General Meeting will be held on Saturday 27th October, in Canberra. Maybe you could be there?

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

cd reviews



On listening to the long-awaited Tony Eardley CD, Desire Lines, I was both surprised and spell-bound. Surprised: mainly because, as a solo singer, I have sometimes found the words a little hard to understand due to Tony's rather soft voice. Spell-bound: because of the delicious balance in the production between instruments and voice, songs both gentle and powerful, and just generally because of the very poetry in the combination of the words and the music.

In both his own songs and those that he covers, Tony's interpretations are wonderfully complementary and sensitive. The CD'S opening track, "When the City Wakes" is beautifully embellished by Gregg Tullion's soprano sax, which adds an eerie atmosphere to the description of a pre-dawn town and the life lead by people with nowhere else to live but on the street. This is in direct contrast to "Portugal Beach", which evokes a feeling of free-living carelessness in the reminiscences on bygone days.

There are some poignant songs such as "On an Empty Road" and "Elegy" that describe love and loss in their most tragic and powerful moments. The song "Blues Run the Game" is a special favourite of mine. The gentle, rhythmic and easy interpretation make the inherent sadness in the song seem sweet.

The final track, "Come Away With Me", stands out from the others in style and instrumentation. Though it is not perhaps as tuneful as some of the other songs, the similes and metaphors in the poetry are all that is needed to make this a fine piece of music. Other outstanding songs include "On Days Like This" and "Water From the Well".

The help of some other well-known and talented musicians such as Liz Frencham on double-bass and Christine Wheeler on low whistle, and the sensitive vocal backing of Rachel Hore and Helen Rowe, make this CD compulsive listening. This is a CD worthy to be counted as the next in your collection.

Railway's Coming Through

Sydney based singer songwriter John Hospodaryk has recently joined the growing numbers of songwriters and poets who turned to railways as a theme for their songs or poems. In doing so he is keeping alive an ongoing traditions of Australian artists and writers that can be traced back to the days of horse drawn and convict railways that existed in the days before steam.

Inspired by the National Rail Heritage conference that was held in Tamworth during the 150th Anniversary of Steam Railways

in NSW John as just released a CD of 15 railway related songs that capture some of life and the events of railways over that time.

All music arrangements on the CD are John's. These relate to the music scores of his own original songs , one or two traditional railway items and a version the "Indian Pacific" written by Joy Mc Kean for Slim Dusty in the 1970's that describes the magical trip by train from Sydney to Perth.

John's musical arrangements on the CD features and bring out many aspects of his fine folk guitar playing. In true railway music tradition that has been influenced every music styles in the book, he throws in a "delta blues" description of a NSW 36 Class in an original song "Pig on the line." The "pig " in this case refers to the "C36" class locomotives that railwaymen say looked like and acted like this animal.

What I particularly like about this CD was the fact that John explores some features of the Australian Railway Story that are often overlooked by those wanting to write about the folklore of Australian Railways.

Two songs on the CD that contribute to the interest of those who might like to have a closer look at Australian Railways Folklore at some stage as themes for their songs and poems are "Fifteen Tunnels" (Kuranda Rail) in North Queensland and the "Long Trestle Bridge" at Gundagai in NSW.

These songs were no doubt written after a trip on the still operating railway heritage trains that run up into the Great Dividing Range at the back of Cairns and down south through Gundagai.

"Fifteen Tunnels" joins several others songs that have been written about this mountain railway over the years. The reference to "Long Trestle Bridge" is a reminder that the "Navvies" or maybe the "Chippies" bridge carpenters with little more than an axe and wood saw built these bridges from the trees along the line as they went. Bradfield the railway engineer who built and designed Sydney Harbour Bridge learnt the trade of bridge building from such people. Also this bridge put an end to bullock drivers and their "bloody "dogs being bogged in the Gundagai area.

The final item on John's CD I wish to mention is "Coming with Me Dancing" a tribute to the contribution made railways to our dancing heritage. This song in Waltz tempo I feel will find it's way into a number of the Bush Dance Band's repertoires. Nothing like a good tune to sing along to as you swing your partner round the hall, check it out.

Keep an eye out for John over the next few months as he takes his songs around the Folk Clubs and Festivals. I'm sure he has a few more songs based on his railway experiences to present. Maybe you can suggest a few topics for him to consider as he spreads his song writing efforts.

Finally the Ishbel MacAskill CD "Essentially Ishbel" also will appear at Folk Trax. TA
