

Irish Music Festival Goulburn - June 2007

Sessionfest at Maitland being washed out (literally) this year, Pete West and I ventured to Goulburn, to check out the Festival of Irish Music Fleadh Nua.

Our first impression on entering Goulburn was that this was a very low key event indeed - for there was no indication in the main street that I could see that a festival was even happening. We called into the Goulburn Visitors Centre where there were programs available but little other info. Only when one entered any of the several performance venues could one be sure that a festival was going on at all. But in those venues we visited we were met with enthusiastic if not boisterous crowds, and an excellent array of talented performers of Irish song music and dance.

We caught some of the concert acts at the renovated upstairs lounge of the Astor Hotel. Far and away our favourites were Trouble In the Kitchen who put on a wonderful show as usual, and Sean Roche. Trouble gave a most entertaining and polished performance. Ben Stephenson leads this fine band with expertise and all the other musicians in the group are great as well.

Sean Roche of the West Australian Settlers group, presented a most amusing and spirited concert set. He has a tuneful and powerful voice and his deliveries fairly filled the auditorium, to be sure, and he is truly a master at working the crowd. A high point of his show was his skilful involvement of his audience in the chorus singing of well known songs like The Old Triangle and Fields of Athen Rye. His was a most moving performance.

Among our our favoured vinyl albums are those we have from the 70s by the West Australian Settlers. Sean very kindly gave me copies of his more recent solo cd albums to share with listeners to our folk music radio programmes, and they are very listenable recordings indeed.

A lot of familiar faces were there and by all accounts this was a successful & satisfying little festival. Trouble were great and had all the feet tapping. There were some excellent acts at Goulburn, including Janine Redmond (All Ireland Accordion Champion) and Michael Harrison (All Ireland Champion Fiddler) who were out of this world as was Trouble in the Kitchen. Sean Roche was wonderful and has an excellent voice and stage presence.

Our time was well spent at this enjoyable event.

Great folk singer and sharer of songs



Commemorating Dave Alexander
ten years on

Dave Alexander joined the great chorus in the sky 2 August 1997 – aged 52. He was a big bastard though he slimmed down to about 25 stone in his later years. I reckon if he'd been 5' 6" he would still have been a larger than life force on the folk scene – ever present at country folk festivals, clubs and sessions, belting out unaccompanied chorus songs and shanties.

His blusterous behaviour often alienated your regular folkie (other XXXOX's complained that Dave gave them a bad name). But he could also be a gentle fellow and his passion for songs endeared him to many. And we also made allowances because of the pain he evidently suffered. Dave was a regular at the Friday night sessions at the Glengarry Hotel in Redfern where he encouraged others – especially newcomers to the scene. He was extremely generous in lending albums, making cassettes and writing out words for people.

In the year before he died, Dave was drawing up a list of songs to record and wanted various of the regulars at the Glen to join in the choruses. A group of us decided to make his dream a reality posthumously, and at the many wakes and concerts commemorating his death, we collected money for this purpose – with the Folk Federation of NSW kindly lending its facilities for caretaking the funds. Many volunteers listened to tapes that Dave had made over a couple of decades and Mike Reed cleaned them up and in some places, added fresh choruses recorded the team Dave had envisaged (under the title Dave had also selected – The Bilgewater and Fishtackle Ensemble). The CD titled: *Singer at Large* was put out in 1998. All costs were covered and there was even a little money left over that was made available for other Folk Federation recording projects. (I still have about 70 copies of the CD left – appropriately under my bed – well – you see – it's Dave's bed – made for him by Terry Gleeson – so I feel I can double my weight and still feel well supported!! Contact me if you'd like a copy: featherswedge@yahoo.com.au)

Ten years after Dave's death, Miguel Heatwole organised a commemorative session at The Friend In Hand in Glebe on Friday 3 August 2007. Nearly 50 people came – about 20 of which were frequent contributors to the sessions at the Glen; about 15 would have known Dave from clubs and festivals; and about 15 were new to the folk scene since Dave's time. All were people who shared Dave's love of chorus singing – and they were the order of the evening – I noted 50 songs sung. It was grand to see folks again – you only get a chorus that large at the National Folk Festival – and to know that that style of singing is still appreciated.

There was a heart-stopping moment when a young Indian man pulled out a sitar, played and sang; and suddenly everyone realised they were hearing a traditional Irish song with the refrain ... "And you never will be able for to plough the Rocks of Bawn" – magic!

There was a collection to cover the rent of the upstairs room and the excess (about \$140) was donated to Amnesty International.

Putting Folk in Context



Back in June, a remarkable thing occurred in major concert halls around Australia. Folk music (via the charismatic traditional singer, Danny Spooner and the brilliant fiddle-player, Mike Kerin) took the stage with Richard Tognetti and the Sydney Chamber

Orchestra for a series of concerts titled "Enchanted" extending from Perth to Melbourne, Sydney, Brisbane and stops between.

Because I knew Danny was including John Warner's song, *Newell Highway*, I was keen to be at the Opera House for the opening concert and was lucky enough to score a front row seat along with Jane and Bill Scott (Bill's uncle Bill was the author of the *Innisfail Song*, aka *Hey Rain* which was also on the program).

It was interesting being so close and seeing the response of the classical musicians to the folk, and vice versa. Danny and Mike sat with ecstatic smiles as they absorbed the music of Bach and Paganini, Mike fascinated with the techniques of the three violin players, as they in turn seemed to be with his fiddle playing. And seeing the classical musos let loose on tunes like *The Hangman's Reel*, and songs like *Jack Orion*, *Hey Rain* and *All for me Grog* was a treat. I was particularly smitten with the seal song – the arrangement was exquisite.

The applause for the traditional songs and the fiddle playing from the mostly classical music lovers in the audience was most gratifying. There was a smattering of folkies in the crowd as the *Sydney Morning Herald* reporter noticed – some of whom could not refrain from joining in the odd chorus (but very softly!). It was great to see how many supporters Danny had who had come up from Tasmania (or managed to tie it in with other commitments in Sydney) and I was delighted to be with them after the concert in full view of the Harbour Bridge when the City kindly put on a display of fire works. We could only conclude this was to celebrate Danny's success

Now, around this time, I received an interesting email from Joe Dolce – it's a tonic to read his weekly newsletters! His 6 July piece contained an item from the *Washington Post* following an experiment of having a world famous classical violinist (Joshua Bell) busking at the exit of a busy metropolitan railway station at 7.51am. It was "an experiment in context, perception and priorities -- as well as an unblinking assessment of public taste: In a banal setting at an inconvenient time, would beauty transcend?" In the next 43 minutes, as the violinist performed six classical pieces on an instrument worth \$3.5 million, 1,097 people passed by. Well – 7 people stopped to take in the performance; 27 gave money (his takings were \$32). Gob-smacking, hey! The full story is at <http://www.washingtonpost.com/wp-dyn/content/article/2007/04/04/AR2007040401721.html> Joe concludes: "profound art needs CONTEXT in order for it to be visible to the majority": and I wish, I wish, there were more musical directors around like Tognetti who would be willing to include folk music in their programs and expose it to appreciative audiences.

Dick Gaughan

nobody sings like Dick Gaughan

Scottish musician, singer, songwriter, guitarist, composer, record producer and man of social conscience. Dick is one of the worlds most admired guitarists and songwriters and his work with Billy Bragg, Andy Irvine and bands Boys of the Lough, Five Hand Reel and Clan Alba is legendary.

His guitar playing is innovative, sensitive, expressive, and beautiful; his voice is by turns tender, angry, passionate and totally unique. *Nobody sings like Dick Gaughan.*

Born from Highland Scots and Irish parents, Dick Gaughan is the established voice of Scotland, singing songs of struggle, resistance and love. A professional musician and singer since 1970, Gaughan made his first solo album in 1971 and has recorded extensively since then and in many countries and in various combinations. He's produced 15 solo albums and contributed to a further 20 compilations. His work has always entwined with the Union movement and the album *O True and Bold*, made for the Scottish Mine Workers Union during the miners strike of 1985 was a most notable and powerful album.

Much of Dick's output has been a mixture of traditional and contemporary material mostly of other writers. His latest work has focused much more on his own song writing and his latest album *Lucky for Some* includes eight new songs out of ten on the album. And while his love of the tradition guides most of his endeavours his writing covers a wide spectrum of contemporary social and political issues.

Dick's greatest musical love is for the ancient traditional Scots ballads. Also known as The Muckle Sangs (the big songs), these are the big story songs, which form a substantial part of Scotland's living wealth of traditional song. Full of mystical and supernatural references, they are very dramatic and powerful, and Gaughan is the greatest living exponent of these powerful traditional compositions.

cd review



What a pleasure it is to review Jig Zag's third studio CD! As a fan from day one, *In The Middle* is, I feel, recorded and produced beautifully. It captures the very best, in every way, from these remarkable musicians – Greg Bryce (guitar), Caroline Trengrove (violin and flute) and Liz Frencham (double bass). It's the perfect follow-up to *Jig Zag Live!*

After ten years together, the improvement, or perhaps expansion, is there for all to see: Vocally, Instrumentally and Songwritingly. After repeated listenings, I would say that *In The Middle* offers more variety than previously, even though no guest appearances emerge – there is no need! The sound is complete and undeniably Jig Zag. It ventures further into the creative potential of each member's abilities, but without losing any of the Jig Zag 'Factor-X'.

The obvious Celtic flavour has always combined (using the Factor-X Recipe Book for Jig Zags) with various other influences, but never quite so completely or adventurously.

In The Middle is a great journey, from "vintage" Jig Zag, with songs like *'New Shine'* (Bryce) – uplifting and encouraging, and *'Tsunami Surfing'* and *'Building Canoes'* (Trengrove) – scorching tunes clearly evidencing, screaming out each of the band's instrumental abilities; the delicate intimacy of Frencham's *'The Weaver Song'*, *'My Reason'* and the unmistakable *'Jericho'* to a lighter, equally delicate and jazz flavoured *'Rejoice'* and *'Over The Fence'* (Trengrove) – with Caroline displaying some very handy swing violin indeed; and then Greg's Crunching guitar in *'Get Back Home'* (Bryce) and the corker title track *'In The Middle'*, where Bryce manages to weave seamlessly between a pulse of 5 and 6 in a bubbly characteristically catchy melody.

If you've enjoyed Jig Zag in the past because they make you (let you) feel good, well, I suspect you're off to the CD store, or their web site, or back stage perhaps – because that's what *In The Middle* offers. It is an album that comes from the heart and speaks to the heart.


