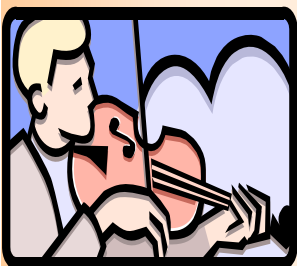
- May 19<sup>th</sup> will be a 'Round Robin' format and don't forget we start at 7.30 pm and finish at 10.30pm.

## Guest Artists – June 16 Concert

### Karen Lynne & Acoustic Shock – June 16. 7.30 – 11.00



Acoustic Shock is a traditional Bluegrass Band consisting of multi award winning musicians Jim Rush (Guitar), Martin Louis (banjo, 5

string Dobro), Nigel Lever (Mandolin) & Quentin Fraser (Dobro & Bass).

Their music is clean 3 part harmony singing traditional bluegrass. Influences include Flat & Scruggs, the Osborne Bros and the Louvin Bros. Acoustic Shock will be joined by Multi Award winning artist Karen Lynne whose bluegrass album 'Changes' has been hailed 'an international album in the class of Alison Krauss & Rhonda Vincent', with 3 singles charting on the Australian Charts, with one reaching No.2. Karen adds a dynamic and contemporary touch to the group with her vocals conjuring up a mixture of influences that

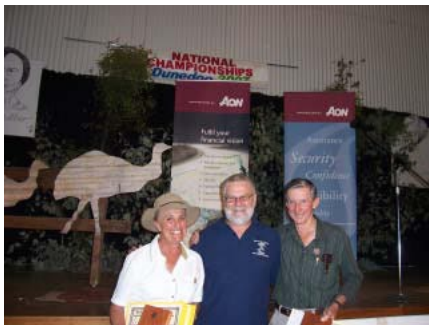
include Alison Krauss, Claire Lynch and Judith Durham.

Playing together also led to the recording of the collaborative Bluegrass album 'Blue Mountain Rain', which most notably placed Karen as the first Australian female Artist to release a complete Bluegrass Album. In 2005 the band completed a UK & Europe tour which included support to top US Bluegrass act "Ricky Skaggs & Kentucky Thunder".

The concert performance will be broken into 2 parts with Karen & Acoustic Shock performing in the 2<sup>nd</sup> half supported by a variety of Club Members in the 1st half. See you there.

# Festival Reviews

## 2007 Illawarra Folk Festival

It was a while ago, but here goes.... 2007 was the second year for the festival at the Bulli site and there were a few changes made to the various stages on the site to make the most of it. It was also my first time camping at the festival, which was a great way to relax and enjoy the weekend. Highlights for me included performances by David Essig (from Canada), Andrew Winton, Crazy Creek, and the Sydney Balalaika Orchestra. I found the bluegrass sessions not as much fun as last year (i.e. they didn't go all night) but there certainly were a lot of musos putting in the hours in the session bar. Latitude played three sets over the weekend, my own favourite being the all acoustic performance in the tiny Chapel at the top of the hill, with views out over the ocean. Apparently the festival was a success, so I do hope to see you there next year!

## Blue Mountains Music Festival

Barbara Clout and I set off on a sunny St. Patrick's Day morning and attended the Festival at Katoomba.

First off, we attended *'The Spooky Men's Chorale'* a popular group who often performs at the National Folk Festival. An all-male choir, dressed in black, give their unique slant on pop songs (*Am I Not Pretty enough* - complete with beard-combing) and also original funny compositions. This group plasters their venues with posters such as "Spooky Man Elected Unopposed". Sitting in the sun outside the marquee, I ended up sunburnt. We then were off to a crowded, hot indoor venue to see Vin Garbutt, a traditional English Folk Singer, very highly regarded and talented, but I felt a touch of boredom with all the songs sounding the same. We then somehow managed to squeeze in for a look at the National Junk Band, led by Mick Conway, with the

fabulous Jim Conway on harmonica. This band has been described as 'a cross between the Sex Pistols and Monty Python'.

Off then to the Star performer (my thoughts, as I gave him his first job in Australia many years ago). Rory McLeod, busker extraordinaire and one-man-band. He plays a host of instruments, using mostly harmonica, taps on shoes, vocal acrobatics and wonderful original material. Kerrie-Anne Cox was a new name to me. She has been elected as Chairperson for the Aboriginal people at Beagle Bay and her songs are about her people-looking forward and not back. She has won many awards in the last year, plays guitar and sings with a glorious voice, and has a very good stage presence.

By this time it was raining the proverbial *'cats and dogs'* and people flocked into the tent, rain ran down the floor and it became very uncomfortable. But the next act was the Star performer and had also been interviewed on ABC twice in the previous fortnight. Luka Bloom is the younger brother of Christie Moore. He has been performing his low-key melodic compositions around the world for 36 years. The gentle Irish brogue doesn't help either. His guitar playing and voice are both gentle on the ear and the songs were mostly about Ireland, the beautiful landscape and the Irish people. By this time, the mist had come down, and all was wet and miserable- so home we went to the motel, warm pyjamas and our food and drink stash.

Excitement on Sunday morning; I burnt the toast and set the smoke alarm off in our motel room. We then found the Festival car park was all mud so we had to find a parking spot in the street. We struggled through the mud to see Alistair Hulett and Dave Swarbrick. Their set comprised of duets and solos from each artist. Dave was not well, but still showed some of his virtuoso fiddle playing. I don't know what to say about

Mikangelo and the Black Sea - their sound check went overtime and we all know what that does to our Festival schedules. I don't think I have laughed so much for years. Mikangelo has a very powerful baritone voice and kept the very off-beat songs and jokes coming at a pace.

The venues; school, RSL and Clarendon Guest House are all close together with the car park in one block. There is no camping, but plenty of cheap accommodation nearby. The Festival seems to be outgrowing the venue; while chairs placed outside each venue is all right in good weather but the main tent blew down and ripped during the night. Nevertheless, a new tent was up and running by 1pm on Saturday. There were also plenty of volunteers cleaning up, plenty of porta-loos.... plenty of them meant no waiting in the rain. All in all it was a great Festival.

## St Albans Folk Festival
